Work areas of the program



Data, awareness and capacity building: research, studies, workshops, seminars and courses to build the capacities of decision-makers and stakeholders in the agriculture and rural sectors in new spheres of the bioeconomy.



Roadmaps: development and implementation of tools to create country-specific roadmaps to capitalize on the bioeconomy.



Policy, regulatory and legislative frameworks: support for the administration of policies, regulations and market incentives that facilitate new applications of the bioeconomy in agricultural production and rural areas.



Investments and chain strategies: support in designing and implementing strategies and projects, as well as encouraging investment to foster new bioeconomy business models in rural areas and agricultural value chains.
